### Safe Sanctuary Policy

The General Conference of the United Methodist Church has mandated that all United Methodist Conferences and Churches develop and implement Safe Sanctuary Policies and Procedures. The 2011 Session of the Upper New York Annual Conference voted to move forward with implementing this mandate this year. The intent of said policies and procedures is to protect children and youth who participate in the church and in church facilities, those who work with children and youth, and the church and conference itself. Unfortunately, there are instances of child emotional, physical, and sexual abuse occurring in churches. These instances occur not only in Roman Catholic Churches but Protestant churches as well. Some of it occurs among unsupervised children and youth. With these policies and procedures in place, we will be able to confidentially say to families with children and youth that we have done everything in our power to ensure that our church community and facility is a safe place for their children to develop as Christians.

The former North Central, Troy and Wyoming Conferences had successfully developed and implemented their policies and procedures prior to 2010. So, we are fortunate to know what works. We have developed a draft policy and procedure that we will implement in 2012 as a working policy and procedures, and would welcome your insights and input so that the policy and procedures we establish meet the needs of this concern. Key to this policy is the practice of screening all people in our church who will work with children and youth. Included in this process will be an interview, background checks through a national criminal database and the county sexual abuser data base, and reference checks. Persons currently working with our children and youth or employed with us will not need to have the interview or reference check but will have the criminal background check. Those who drive will have a Department of Motor Vehicle check. All screening will be done in such a way that confidentiality will be maintained as well. Another feature of the policy will be that there must be two unrelated adults present with children and youth. This doesn't mean that related adults and youth can't work with children, just that two unrelated adults must be present. There are also guidelines to follow when there is an accusation or discovery of abuse. There are likely to be questions about this policy and procedures. Pastor Will is happy to discuss this with people.

The Safe Sanctuary Policy and Procedures are available on the table outside the Sanctuary for those currently attending. If you did not receive a copy and would like one please contact the church office and we will happily send you one. The policy will be introduced at the Church Conference on October 18 at 7 p.m. It will also be presented for questions and discussion after the 10 a.m. Church service on October 23 and November 13.

The United Methodist Church of North Chili is offering a course, "Gaining Faith and Understanding through the Study of Lost Christianity." The course, facilitated by the Rev. Dr. Wilfredo J. Baez, Pastor, will be held in the church's Adams Hall on Wednesday nights from 7 pm – 830 pm. Part 1(12 sessions) of the course will be held October 5 through December 21, with one class being held on Monday, November 21 (Thanksgiving week). Part 2 (12 sessions) of the course will be held January 4, 2012 through May 21, skipping February 22 (Ash Wednesday). The goal of the course is to gain a greater understanding of what constituted early Christianity and how Christianity and the Bible came to be what it is today by examining texts like the Gnostic Gospels that were until this century lost to us. Dr. Baez is a long-time student of World Religions, and is interested in how mystical, inner, esoteric and Gnostic currents in Christianity can benefit Orthodox, Mainline, and Evangelical believers and seekers of truth with any or no religious preference. The program cost is by donation on a sliding scale \$0-\$50 for part 1, \$0-\$50 for part 2 or \$0-\$5 per session. You determine what you can pay with no questions asked. Proceeds support the development of a Hispanic Ministry at the church. ### Gospel of Thomas Scripture Study

The United Methodist Church of North Chili will offer a scripture study, "The Gospel of Thomas," led by their Pastor, the Reverend Dr. Wilfredo J. Baez, on Sunday afternoons beginning October 16 and continuing throughout the year. at 1:00 pm in Adams Hall. Not part of the canon of the New Testament Scripture, the Gospel of Thomas is an early sayings gospel of Jesus, dated in the first or second century. It's a collection of 114 sayings attributed to Jesus. It includes sayings of Jesus found in the Gospels of Mark, Matthew and Luke, sayings similar to these but with a twist, and some seeming to convey secret teachings. We will explore this scripture in the manner that it may have been studied in antiquity, utilizing contemplative prayer and meditation, reading of the scripture one coda or verse at a time, having commentary, and questions and answers. The aim of this study is not academic or intellectual but to attain spiritual understanding and transformation. It is best to commit oneself to the daily study of this text and weekly participation in the study, although occasional absences are anticipated. We will utilize the translation of the Gospel of Thomas by Thomas Lambdin. This study is free but participants can make a free will/love offering to support development of new ministries. The Leader, Dr. Baez, is a long-time student of World Religions, and is interested in how the Gospel of Thomas can assist its readers, believers and seekers, religious and non-religious, in growing in their faith and knowledge of God,. It will support and add to their understanding of both the Bible as we know it and the way of Jesus and the early Christians. #### Who Was Jesus?

**The Last Days:** The Passion is well-known. But much of its details were recorded hundreds of years after Jesus' death. Jesus entered Jerusalem in a donkey, but this familiar Easter image was not just a celebration, but a powerful political challenge. It started a chain of defiant events that would see Jesus crucified. But where and how? Three bible experts examine new archeological digs deep under the city and the ruins of the Old Temple. Many of the famous sites of Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection now have to be re-sited! And many of the reputations of the key characters - Judas, Pontius Pilate - will have to be redrawn! This final part of "Who Was Jesus?" examines the historical reality of the greatest story ever told."

#### New Testament

*Taught By Professor Bart D. Ehrman, M.Div., Ph.D., Princeton Theological Seminary, The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill*  
*Whether you consider it a book of faith or a cultural artifact, the New Testament is among the most significant writings that the world has ever known. Scarcely a single major writer in the last 2,000 years has failed to rely on the web of meaning contained in the New Testament to communicate. Yet the New Testament is also among the most widely disputed and least clearly understood books in history. In these lectures Professor Bart D. Ehrman develops for you a carefully reasoned understanding of the New Testament—and the individuals and communities who created its texts. Importantly, Professor Ehrman's approach is as an historian, and the course "suspends" belief or disbelief to understand how, when, why, and by whom the New*

*Testament was written. He explains in detail the light that historical research brings to the texts. He also reviews key texts omitted from the New Testament. "Our ultimate goal is to come to a fuller appreciation and understanding of these books that have made such an enormous impact on the history of Western civilization and that continue to play such an important role for people today," says Dr. Ehrman. Lectures Include:*

#### **The Earliest Traditions About Jesus**

Even though the earliest traditions about Jesus go back to eyewitnesses, the Gospels were not written down for several decades. Why do scholars think that during this period, some traditions about Jesus came to be modified or even created?

#### **Mark—Jesus the Suffering Son of God**

Mark is the shortest and oldest of the four Gospels. Its unknown author had access to oral traditions about Jesus. Mark orders these traditions into a portrait of Jesus as the authoritative but almost universally misunderstood Messiah and Son of God, whose mission is to suffer and die for the sins of the world.

#### **Matthew—Jesus the Jewish Messiah**

Because Matthew, Mark, and Luke share so many of the same stories, they are often called the "Synoptic" Gospels. Their similarities are usually taken to mean that one, Mark, served as a source for the other two. One of the ways to study Matthew and Luke is to compare them to Mark, looking for evidence of modifications. Matthew in particular stresses Jesus' Jewish identity and his relationship to currents within the Judaism of his age.

#### **Luke—Jesus the Savior of the World**

Luke emphasizes Jesus as a Jewish prophet. Jesus knows that it is God's plan for his salvation to go out to the whole world, and hence does not predict the imminent end of the age. The message of salvation must first go out to the Gentiles, which will take time. Since the church will be in the world for a long haul, Luke puts a special stress on Jesus' "social" message of compassion for the poor and downtrodden.

#### **John—Jesus the Man from Heaven**

In John's strikingly singular account, Jesus' own identity is the core issue. Rather than simply being a misunderstood representative of God's will, or a rejected prophet, or a Jewish messiah sent from the Jewish God in fulfillment of the Jewish scriptures, John's Jesus is himself divine, equal with God, an incarnation of God's own Word through which he created the universe.

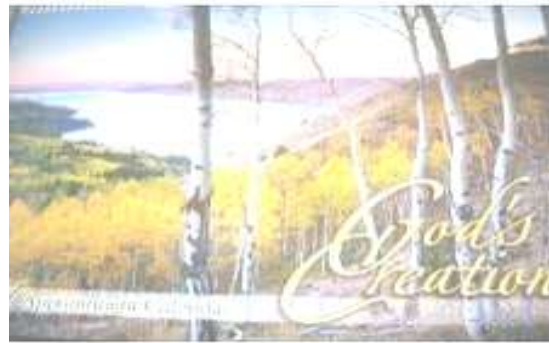
### Education Committee

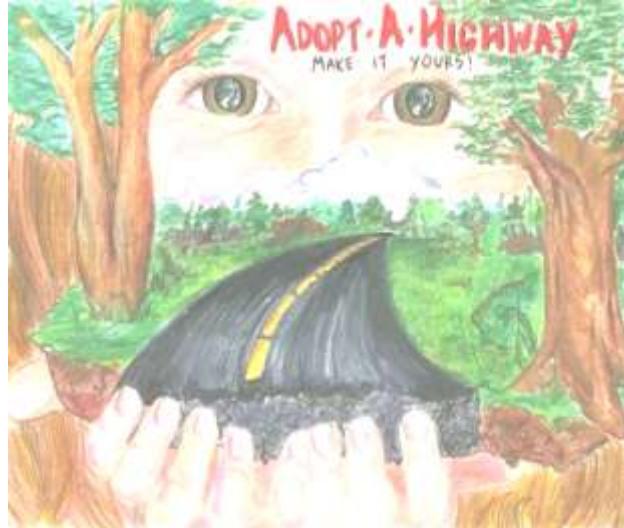
