It is good for us to remember to align ourselves with God and one another as we move forward into the church year. What follows is our Church's vision, mission, core value and core belief statements.

### Our Vision Statement

*Genuinely welcoming all, loving all, accepting all*

### Our Mission Statement

*By participating in the life of the church,  
we grow spiritually and are empowered to live our faith.*

### Our Core Values

Welcoming — we value a church that is engaging, open to everyone, and offers hospitality to all.

Genuineness — we value a church that is authentic, down-to-earth, accessible and real

Worship — we value a church where joyful, heartfelt worship, praising the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, is the heart of our life together.

Outreach and Service — we value a church where faith, love and compassion are expressed by action.

Transformational Growth — we value a church where our relationship with God and with God's people is nurtured as we journey and learn together, growing into the likeness of Christ.

### Our Core Beliefs

The United Methodist Church was founded by John Wesley. John Wesley believed that the "living core of the Christian Faith was revealed in scripture, illuminated by tradition, vivified in personal experience and confirmed by reason." Contrasting the Methodist movement with other religious societies of his day, he said, "The Methodists alone do not insist on you holding this opinion or that opinion; but they think and let think."

Although not primarily a denomination of creeds, the United Methodist Church shares with other Christians the doctrinal heritage of the Apostles' and Nicene Creeds. Besides the Methodist and Evangelical United Brethren adaptations of the Articles of Religion of the Church of England, other United Methodist basic beliefs include:

A Triune God - The essential unit of Father, Son and Holy Spirit embraces the biblical witness to God's activity in creation, God's salvation in Christ, and God's continuing presence in our everyday lives.

God's Prevenient Grace - The grace of God that precedes any and all conscious impulses. We are loved regardless of who we are or what we have done.

Justification and Assurance - Also known as conversion, the process of being "justified" or restored to a right relationship with God through faith in Christ, is what Jesus described as being "reborn." We can expect to receive assurance of this forgiveness of our sins, or salvation, through the work of the Holy Spirit.

Sanctification and Perfection - New birth is only the first step in the process of sanctification of "holiness." The Holy Spirit's "sanctifying grace" draws us toward Christian perfection, which according to Wesley is a heart "habitually filled with the love of God and neighbor."

Faith and Good Works - Faith is the only response essential for salvation, but salvation evidences itself in good works. God's grace calls forth human response and discipline.

Oneness of the Church of Christ - Our ecumenical commitment as United Methodists is to share our own religious heritage with the larger Christian family. We confess a belief in "one holy, catholic (or universal) and apostolic church" which calls us to Christian unity at local, national, and world levels.

Nurture and Mission of the Church - Personal faith is nourished by the worshiping community which mobilizes connectional ties that bind us for service to the world. Personal salvation always involves Christian mission, and love of God is always linked with love of neighbor.

Two Sacraments - We believe in two Sacraments ordained by Christ, Baptism and the Lord's Supper, are symbols and pledges of the Christian's profession and of God's love toward us. They are the means of grace by which God works invisibly in us, quickening, strengthening, and confirming our faith in Him.

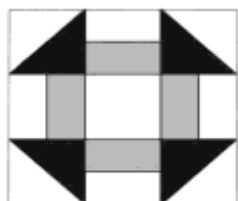
### Bottles and Cans for Youth

### Noisy Collection

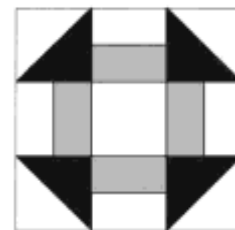
Remember the Noisy Collection offering the church participated in during Sunday services this past June? We collected \$203 that was given to UMCOR to help families impacted by the spring floods and tornadoes in the US. We will be having another Noisy Collection offering in October. Donations will be given to the Methodist Evangelical Methodist Church of Nicaragua Children's Feeding Program. Food is provided to children in the 22 Methodist churches in Nicaragua. 80-100 children can be provided 3 meals a week for one month for \$100.00. There are 80-100 children being fed in each church. These churches have been established in some of the poorest communities in Nicaragua, mostly in the capital city of Managua. Pastor Will has worked with this country's churches in the past and has an ongoing relationship with them. The families served by these churches are in desperate need of Christian support. Most live on \$1.00 per day (in addition to shelter). Pastor Will will ask Pastor Francisco Guzman where the greatest need is and ask if that church and ours can enter into a partnership between Sunday schools. 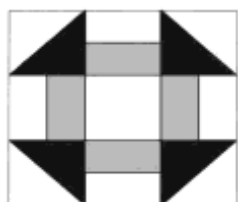
putting up a poster. It's a small thing to do but could have a large impact by letting people know about the show!

You know there are many people who come to the show and can't wait to see what offerings we will have this year!

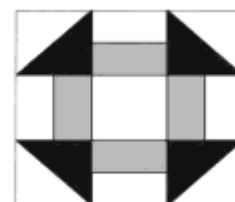

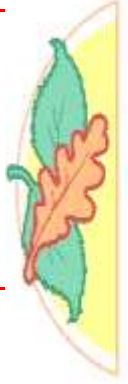

#### Who Was Jesus?

"This is the story of what it was like to be Jesus, to be born into tyranny, to be executed for preaching harmony and forgiveness to ones own warring people, and what it was like for his disciples to risk death by carrying the message of salvation. Historians, archaeologists and theologians examine all kinds of evidence, and dig deeper into Jesus' life and the times he lived in than ever before.

Episodes Include:

**Childhood:** 'The greatest story ever told...' is not the whole story. The Gospels record the teachings of Jesus and the marvels of his ministry. But they leave out what has been taken for granted for two thousand years: the dramatic reality of the Age of Jesus! On an extraordinary journey of discovery through the Holy Land with three expert guides, this film investigates the latest archaeological and historical evidence to piece together a portrait of Jesus. Here, we understand his early years: from birth to a young man - analyzing the forces that shaped the life and work of a man who would change history for ever.

**The Mission:** Jesus was a young man with a determination to change the world of starvation and oppression he grew up in. In AD 30, Galilee was a land under occupation by the Roman Empire. Many charismatic Jewish leaders preached rebellion and resistance. Jesus preached a message of peace - but he was not unique. Now was he the only miracle maker in his time. Three bible experts walk in his footsteps to discover the real world of Jesus - from his life-changing meeting with John the Baptist, through his ministry on the shores of the Sea of Galilee, to his fateful entry into Jerusalem.

**The Last Days:** The Passion is well-known. But much of its details were recorded hundreds of years after Jesus' death. Jesus entered Jerusalem on a donkey, but this familiar Easter image was not just a celebration, but a powerful political challenge. It started a chain of defiant events that would see Jesus crucified. But where and how? Three bible experts examine new archeological digs deep under the city and the ruins of the Old Temple. Many of the famous sites of Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection now have to be re-sited! And many of the reputations of the key characters - Judas, Pontius Pilate - will have to be redrawn! This final part of "Who Was Jesus?" examines the historical reality of the greatest story ever told."

## A daily reminder

Make this bookmark to remind you that God is with you every day.

### What you need:

- An old calendar
- Scissors
- Cardstock
- Glue stick
- Pencil or marker
- Stickers
- Hole punch
- Ribbon or yarn



### What you do:

1. Cut out the first line of squares from an old calendar, including the days of the week along the top.
2. Cut the cardstock into a rectangle a little larger than the calendar section.
3. Glue the calendar section onto the cardstock.
4. Write "God has plans for me" (Jeremiah 29:11) on the bookmark.
5. Add stickers or other decorations on the back.
6. Punch a hole on one end of the bookmark.
7. Loop some ribbon or yarn through the hole.
